36th She continues to work industriously in the kitchen. She is quiet, but talks sensibly and does not appear to have any delusions. Her health is good. She sleeps well at night and talks rationally.

February 2nd

She seems as far as can be ascertained to be now in her natural state so it is proposed that she shall at the next Committee meeting be discharged as having Recovered.
