About 5 days ago without any known reason she became restless and unable to perform her duties indifferently and talked somewhat thoughtfully. She has since become much more listless and for the last two days has been very restless, unable to do any work, and so stupified that she has been delirious, and ceased to be able to speak or take any notice when spoken to. Stiffness of her body and limbs will not walk or move and has therefore to be carried from place to place. She refuses her food and will not bring food. She is sleepless at night, but has not yet been either dirty or destructive. There is every reason to believe that drink is the cause of the attack.

ON ADMISSION

Mind Refuses to speak and disorganized - what is said to her, there was great stiffness of limbs & body. She refuses to smelt & excites being carried - Body - well nourished and she is apparently free from any organic disease.

Was in a very excited state when admitted, throwing herself about, stiffening limbs and body, would not speak and took no notice whatever when spoken to & refused to say a word, she resisted possibly attempts made to dress her so was put to bed. When she lay quiet, but would not take anything or speak and when treated stiffened her limbs in the most peculiar way. During the night she was quiet but did not sleep at all. To day she has remained in bed, and seems rather more rational but she will not speak she has however taken a small quantity of nourishment 7<sup>th</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> 19<sup>th</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> 22<sup>nd</sup>  
17<sup>th</sup> Aft. tiller last night but continues in the same stupid state and remains in bed away from treatment  
18<sup>th</sup> Slept well last night and this morning when treated she answered questions and spoke fairly rationally. She is quiet and has taken her meals well but she has a stupid-confused look and is unable to dress herself, but she assisted herself in dressing  
19<sup>th</sup> Slept well last night and this morning she dressed herself took her breakfast and made herself useful washing up. She speaks when spoken to and apparently conducts herself rationally.  
21<sup>st</sup> Now sleeps well, talks sensibly, takes all her meals and makes herself useful sewing, & cleaning.  
22<sup>nd</sup> She now seems rational in every way and is regularly employed in the kitchen where she makes herself very useful.  
23<sup>rd</sup> Continues to be usefully employed in the kitchen and her mental condition is now very satisfactory she suffers however from neurosthenia and for this she is at present under treatment.  
24<sup>th</sup> Her mental condition continues satisfactory she is fully employed in the kitchen, and since she has been under treatment suffers less from neurosthenia
