DURATION

The present attack has been of three months duration, but previous to that time he had been a patient in the Boro' Asylum. A few months ago he went to America where he has been detained in an asylum for three months; afterward he sailed for this country and reached Norwich a few days ago. He fancies that people are watching and persecuting him, and that devils are after him. He has twice attempted suicide, once by cutting his throat and once by hanging. He wanted to purchase a pistol lately, to shoot his persecutors, but was prevented.

ON ADMISSION Mind *Rational conversation. Dependent look.*

Has auditory hallucinations.

Body *Thin. Heart sounds healthy, lungs fairly healthy, but chest somewhat flattened. Interclavicular spaces where sound are moist.*

Nov. 28th Sleeps fairly well. Talks rationally but does not enter into conversation unless addressed. Looks depressed. Says he can hear people after him. Takes his food.

Nov. 6th Says he hears the same voices talking about ^{him} everywhere as he has heard all along since he left America. Sits in the same place all day taking little notice of anything. Face looks flushed at times. He has the same depressed look.

Nov. 12th Continues in the same apathetic condition, and does not speak unless spoken to.

Nov. 20th Now resides in No. vi. He seems more cheerful and communicative and enters readily into conversation. His auditory hallucinations still continue, and he says he can hear people talking about him wherever he goes, altho' he cannot see them. He takes his food well, and rests fairly well at night.

Nov. 11th For the past week he has been regularly employed on the farm which appears to do him good. He says that now he does not hear the voices, and he is brighter and more cheerful altogether.

Nov. 30th He continues to progress satisfactorily, and his hallucinations have not returned nor does he show any other manifestations of mental derangement. His manner is natural and cheerful. He goes out to work regularly on the farm and enjoys excellent bodily health. His appetite is good and he sleeps well.

Feb. 14th His mental state continues to be natural

and satisfactory in every respect. Under these
 circumstances he will be discharged at the
 Committee meeting next week.

Feb. 27th
