Commenced to do gardening on the female side a few days ago. Very quiet and well conducted. Manner somewhat more cheerful.

He is not so low spirited, but appears to be very hypochondriacal and is much alarmed about the state of his stomach and bowels. He suffers from constipation and takes a dinner pill daily. Continues to go to work. Appetite good the does not complain of sleeplessness.

Manner is more cheerful, he converses rationally and does not dwell upon his ailments. Goes to work regularly. Sleeps well and takes his meals heartily.

April 16<sup>th</sup>

His mental condition appears in every respect to be natural. He is cheerful, contented and rational. Works industriously by on the female side. If he continues in the same satisfactory state he will be discharged at the Committee meeting at the end of this month.

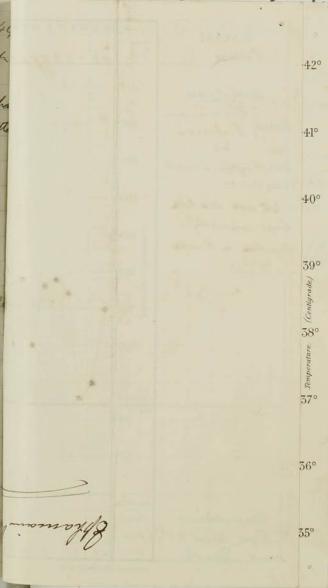
