Mind Excited and restless. Talks in a religious strain.

Body Rather thin. Chest barrel shaped, lungs somewhat emphysematous, moist rales at left apex. Heart healthy & action strong.

Feb. 23rd

Was noisy and restless the greater part of last night. So to-day very excited and noisy. He fears he is to be killed and makes sudden rushes at his supposed enemies. Requires constant attention. Takes his food. Towards evening he became quieter and more rational.

27th

Is much quieter and more rational in his behavior. Rests well and takes all his food.

March 9th

He does not give expression to his delusions. Spends his time reading and evading about. Answers questions readily and says he feels much better, his manner however still appears to be flighty.

26th

Has become rather more susretted, does not enter into conversation readily, prefers to be alone and is rather obstinate. He looks pale and thin. Takes his food heartily and rests well. A few days ago had slight diarrhoea but is now recovered.

April 5th

Has been troubled with dyspepsia but is improved by a mixture of soda and Bismuth. Is more rational and cheerful in his manner and has begun to go out to work in the garden.

May 2nd

Continues to progress very satisfactorily. His mind is quite clear and rational and he is cheerful, sociable and contented. Takes all his meals, sleeps well and goes to work regularly.

May 21st

His mental condition continues to be

satisfactory in every way. Under these circumstances he will be discharged at the Committee meeting next week.

May 29th
